Spring is here, and farm machinery is everywhere. Please use caution while driving!

Spring season is when farm machinery and other vehicles use the same two-lane roads. It's also the season when collisions between farm equipment and other vehicles occur more frequently. Vehicle operators should be especially wary of farm equipment that they could encounter at any time. Lower natural light conditions, especially at dusk, are critical times on rural roads.

any time. Lower natural light conditions, especially at dusk, When encountering farm equipment, vehicle operators should be prepared to stop to avoid a rear-end collision. It takes only five seconds to close a gap the length of a football field if you are going 55 mph and a tractor is going 15 mph. During spring planting season and throughout the year, Kentucky Farm Bureau encourages motorists to watch for farm equipment on public highways.
