Legislative Report No. 7 2018 Kentucky General Assembly

Today marked the twenty-seventh legislative day of the 2018 session of the Kentucky General Assembly. Next week the 2018 session will reach the half-way point.

The House of Representatives continues their work on the State Budget (<u>HB</u> <u>200</u>) for fiscal years 2018-2020. The goal of the House of Representatives is to pass their version of the budget by the end of February.

In addition to advocating for our funding priorities (Agricultural Development Fund, Conservation Cost-Share and Kentucky Department of Agriculture), Kentucky Farm Bureau has been discussing the importance of restoring the cuts made to the direct aid for local conservation districts, both of Kentucky's disease diagnostic laboratories, Kentucky Mesonet, and the University of Kentucky Regulatory Services.

HB 153: R. Heath, D. Bentley, M. Castlen, M. Dossett, J. Gooch Jr., D. Hale, M. Hart, K. Imes, S. Miles, R. Mills, J. Petrie, P. Pratt, M. Prunty, R. Rothenburger, B. Rowland, D. Schamore, J. Sims Jr, W. Stone, W. Thomas, J. Tipton, T. Turner - AN ACT relating to overweight vehicles.

This bill would amend KRS 189.222 to allow for a ten percent weight variance for vehicles transporting feed for livestock or poultry. This bill passed the Senate on Wednesday with Senate Floor Amendment #2. This floor amendment deletes the original provisions of HB 153 and would establish an annual permit for vehicles, engaged exclusively in the transportation of feed for livestock or poultry to a farm or facility housing livestock or poultry, in loads up to 96,000 pounds and set the fee for a permit at \$150. HB 153 as amended passed the full Senate on a vote of 32-5. The bill now goes back to the House for their consideration.

KFB Policy:

"We support the 10% weight exemption on farm trucks and trucks servicing farms hauling agriculture products, similar to the same benefits currently given to the transportation of primary forest products."

HB 10: K. Imes, S. Wells, C. Morgan, K. Upchurch - AN ACT proposing to amend Section 29 of the Constitution of Kentucky relating to administrative regulations.

This bill would propose to amend Section 29 of the Constitution of Kentucky to permit the General Assembly or an agency or committee it creates to review, approve, or disapprove any administrative regulation of the executive branch during or between regular sessions of the General Assembly. This bill passed the House on a vote of 68-22 on Thursday and now heads to the Senate.

KFB Policy:

"We recommend that the state legislature provide specific guidelines and restraints on the agencies that are to administer the laws and are given the power to adopt rules and regulations."

REMINDER:

This year we will again combine our **Legislative Drive-In Day** with our annual **Food Check-Out Day** activities on **March 7, 2018**. This will allow those of you visiting with your legislator(s) the opportunity to present them with a basket of Kentucky grown agricultural products to celebrate the safest most affordable food in the world.

The meeting will begin at 9:00 a.m. in the auditorium of the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, located at 200 Mero Street, Frankfort, Kentucky.

We encourage you to contact your senator and representative in advance to let them know you will be in Frankfort that day and to set up a meeting with them to discuss issues affecting agriculture and to present them with a Food Check-Out Day basket.

The special election for the **49**th **District** will be held **February 20**, and the special election for the **89**th **District** will be held on **February 27**.
